The film is based on the 1995 autobiographical book Long Walk to Freedom by the anti-apartheid revolutionary and former South African President Nelson Mandela. [5] The plot is based on South African President Nelson Mandela's autobiography of the same name, which chronicles his early life, age, education and 27 years in prison before becoming president of South Africa and working to restore the country's once-segregated society. After the publication of Mandela's autobiography, Singh was granted the right to adapt the film, which was completed 16 years later by screenwriter William Nicholson. The film is directed by Justin Chadwick. Music Movie, U2 wrote the song Ordinary Love. [8] [9] On the band's official website, subscribers were able to first hear a short snippet. [10] The film used a lot of African music. Release Film held its world premiere at the Toronto International Film Festival on 7 September 2013. [7] [11] It was released on 28 September 2013. Long Walk to Freedom premiered in London on 5 December 2013 as the Royal Film Performance, the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge were with Mandela's daughters Zindzi and Zenan. The announcement of Nelson Mandela's death took place during the film review; The Duke and Duchess were immediately informed of Nelson's death, while producer Anant Singh (with Idris Elba) took to the stage during the closing credits to inform the patrons of Mandela's death and held a moment of silence. Prince William made brief remarks to the press as he exited the theatre, saying: I just wanted to say that this is extremely sad and tragic news. We have just been reminded of how extraordinary and inspiring Nelson Mandela is. My thoughts and prayers are with him and his family at this time. The film was temporarily pulled from theaters in South Africa the next day out of respect, but back on 7 December 2013[12] [13] [13] on 8 December celebrated the film's launch with a gala dinner, a private screening and a charity auction to help the children's charity Foundation Onetoonchildrensfund. Sir Trevor McDonald was the Master of Ceremonies on the evening, introducing the auction, with one limited edition 6 portrait of the heads of Nelson Mandela, the sculptor of the life of David Gregeen. The head was donated by a sculptor and sold through charitable work in South Africa. A critical response to Rotten Tomatoes, the film has an approval rating of 61% based on 142 reviews with an average rating of 6.21/10. The site's critical consensus is this: It may be too respectful to truly soar, but there's no denying Idris Elba's impressive work on Mandela: The Long Walk to Freedom - or the inspirational power of life it represents. [15] In Metacritic, which determines the average estimate weighted for a review, the average score for a movie is 60 out of 100, based on 32 critics, indicating mixed or average reviews. [16] Scott Foundas of Variety said the film never chooses a light touch as a sledgehammer does, but also praises Elba for a towering performance, Mandela's age. Claudia Puig of USA Today agreed that Elba's performance was powerful, but felt that the film wasn't as strong, saying: Earnest and ambitious, the film suffers from trying to squeeze too many milestones into Nelson Mandela's long lifespan, when he worked to end the oppressive regime of apartheid in South Africa. But the talent of leading actors lends it a hefty, especially leadership performance by Idris Elba as Mandela. [18] Film.com Film.com also gave the film a mixed negative review: Mandela: The Long Walk to Freedom should have been a layup. The slow burn leads to the eventual triumph, with moving calls from Idris Elba raging against injustice, the world made a better place because of one man's sacrifice. But as crazy and offensive as it may seem, you'll get more chills from Elba's idiotic speech about the cancellation of the apocalypse pacific rim than you can get in this by-the-numbers bore. [19] But Peter Travers of Rolling Stone gave the film a generally positive review of 2 and a half of the four stars, mostly around Screenwriter William Nicholson claimed that he didn't do better because of the movie 12 Years a Slave: 12 Years a Slave came out of America and that sucked all the guilt about black people that was available. On the 1976 Soweto uprising, Hiribarren said the film didn't spend much time in the event of this pivotal event because Mandela didn't talk much about Soweto in his book. The Soweto uprising, however, helped create a new political climate in South Africa that directly led to the politicisation of many young South Africans. Hiribarren gave the film three stars for historical accuracy and five pleasures.
